

## IIE Releases New *Open Doors* Report

On November 11<sup>th</sup>, the 2013 *Open Doors Report on International Educational Exchange* was released. Open Doors is supported by a grant from the Bureau of Educational and Cultural Affairs at the U.S. Department of State and is a comprehensive information resource on international students and scholars studying or teaching at higher education institutions in the United States, and U.S. students studying abroad for academic credit at their home colleges or universities.

The report found that the number of international students enrolled in U.S. higher education increased by seven percent to 819,644 students in 2012/13, with 55,000 more students than last year enrolled in colleges and universities across the United States. There are now 40 percent more international students studying at U.S. colleges and universities than a decade ago. A strong increase in the number of "new" international students, those enrolling for the first time at a U.S. college or university in fall 2013, indicates that this growth trend likely will continue.

# IIE Launches Emergency Student Fund for Students from the Philippines

The Institute of International Education (IIE), with support from the Freeman Foundation, has created an Emergency Student Fund (ESF) to help students from the Philippines on U.S. campuses whose home country support has been devastated by the recent Typhoon Haiyan.

Philippines-ESF will provide grants of \$3,000 each to selected Filipino students. Syracuse University can nominate up to three Filipino students who need financial assistance to stay enrolled in the spring 2014 semester. Priority will be given to undergraduates and to those with the most urgent financial need and those closest to graduation.

Applications must be submitted by the Slutzker Center to IIE by December 4, 2013. Awards will be announced in mid-December.

Students interest in seeking a nomination for funds from the Emergency Student Fund should immediately make an appointment to meet with an advisor at the Slutzker Center (call 315-443-2457 or email <a href="lescis@syr.edu">lescis@syr.edu</a> and put Requesting ESF Nomination in the Subject Line) and be prepared to document their urgent need as well as available finances (projected expenses, bank statements, receipts for payments already made, etc.). To get your application to IIE by December 4, 2013, we need your application by December 2, 2013.


Syracuse University's Vice-President of Research, as she provides an overview of key research expectations and varying research norms at the American University. Food will be provided for presentation participants!

# Translations Syracuse Stage November 15-23

Set in a hedge school in rural Ireland in 1833, this powerful drama uses the richness of language and the clash of cultures to explore the impact on a small community as a troop of British Army engineers arrives to map the area and Anglicize the place names. For some there is resentment and suspicion, for some unlikely romance; for all there is the realization that they stand on the brink of irrevocable change. Translations was the first production by the famed Field Day Theatre Company founded by Tony Award-winner Friel and actor Stephen Rea.





# Don't Blame Anyone A Performance by Milton Loayza The Point of Contact Gallery November 21, 6:30pm

Based on short stories by Julio Cortazar, this performance by Milton Loayza tells the story of a man's effort to reconstruct his reality leading him deeper into the unreal. This event is part of Th3 (The Third Thursday) and is free and open to the public.

Milton Loayza is a performer and director who has been focusing in the last four years on bringing Latin American voices to the stage. "Don't Blame Anyone" is a solo performance adapted from various stories by Argentine author Julio Cortazar. It combines the theatrical presence of a single character struggling to make sense of his reality and the fantastic and imaginative lines that pulsate through Cortazar's short fiction.



From 5-8pm visitors are also welcome to view Tango, on display at Point of Contact Gallery. Tango is a 21-piece grand-format folio published by Iris Editions in New York (1991); a collaborative work that includes eight intaglios by the late Nancy Graves and thirteen pages of text by Pedro Cuperman, which gaze at the aesthetics of this Latin American dance.
